

# 4.0V to 5.5V, 1.2A 1ch Synchronous Buck Converter with Integrated FET

### BD8964FVM

### **General Description**

The BD8964FVM is ROHM's high efficiency step-down switching regulator designed to produce a voltage as low as 1V from a supply voltage of 5V. It offers high efficiency by using synchronous switches and provides fast transient response to sudden load changes by implementing current mode control.






Figure 1. Typical Application Circuit




Figure 2. Pin Configuration




Figure 3. Block Diagram




Figure 4. Output Voltage vs Input Voltage




Figure 5. Output Voltage vs EN Voltage




Figure 6. Output Voltage vs Output Current




Figure 7. Output Voltage vs Temperature




Figure 8. Efficiency vs Output Current




Figure 9. Frequency vs Temperature




Figure 10. ON-Resistance vs Temperature





Figure 11. EN Voltage vs Temperature




Figure 13. Frequency vs Input Voltage




Figure 14. Soft Start Waveform




Figure 15. SW Waveform




Figure 16. Transient Response (I<sub>O</sub>=100mA to 600mA, 10µs)




Figure 17. Transient Response (I<sub>O</sub>=600mA to100mA, 10µs)

### **Application Information**

### 1. Operation

BD8964FVM is a synchronous step-down switching regulator that achieves fast transient response by employing current mode PWM control system.

### (1) Synchronous Rectifier

Integrated synchronous rectification using two MOSFETS reduces power dissipation and increases efficiency when compared to converters using external diodes. Internal shoot-through current limiting circuit further reduces power dissipation.

### (2) Current Mode PWM Control

The PWM control signal of this IC depends on two feedback loops, the voltage feedback and the inductor current feedback.

### (a) PWM (Pulse Width Modulation) Control

The clock signal coming from OSC has a frequency of 1Mhz. When OSC sets the RS latch, the P-Channel MOSFET is turned on and the N-Channel MOSFET is turned OFF. The opposite happens when the current comparator (Current Comp) resets the RS latch i.e. the P-Channel MOSFET is turned OFF and the N-Channel MOSFET is turned on. Current Comp's output is a comparison of two signals, the current feedback control signal "SENSE" which is a voltage proportional to the current I<sub>L</sub>, and the voltage feedback control signal, FB.




Figure 18. Diagram of Current Mode PWM Control




Figure 19. PWM Switching Timing Diagram

### 2. Description of Functions

### (1) Soft-Start Function

During start-up, the soft-start circuit gradually establishes the output voltage to limit the input current. This prevents the overshoot in the output voltage and inrush current.

### (2) Shutdown Function

When EN terminal is "Low", the device operates in Standby Mode, and all functional blocks such as the reference voltage circuit, internal oscillator, and drivers, are turned OFF. Circuit current during standby is 0µA (Typ).

### (3) UVLO Function

The UVLO circuit detects whether the supplied input voltage is sufficient to obtain the output voltage of this IC. The UVLO threshold has a hysteresis of 100mV (Typ) to prevent the output from chattering.




Figure 20. Soft Start, Shutdown, UVLO Timing Chart

### (4) Short-Circuit Current Protection with Time Delay Function

To protect the IC from breakdown, the short-circuit protection turns the output OFF when the internal current limiter is activated continuously for at least 1 ms. The output that is held OFF may be turned ON again by restarting EN or by resetting UVLO.





Figure 21. Short-Current Protection with Time Delay Diagram

### 3. Information on Advantages

Advantage 1: Offers fast transient response by using current mode control system.

Advantage 2 : Offers high efficiency because of synchronous rectifiers

For heavier load:

This IC utilizes the synchronous rectifying mode and uses low ON-Resistance power MOSFETs.

ON-Resistance of P-Channel MOSFET:  $350m\Omega(Typ)$  ON-Resistance of N-Channel MOSFET:  $250m\Omega(Typ)$ 




Figure 23. Efficiency




Figure 24. Example Application

### 4. Switching Regulator Efficiency

Efficiency η may be expressed by the equation shown below:

$$\eta = \frac{V_{OUT} \times I_{OUT}}{V_{IN} \times I_{IN}} \times 100 = \frac{P_{OUT}}{P_{IN}} \times 100 = \frac{P_{OUT}}{P_{OUT} + Pd\alpha} \times 100$$

Efficiency may be improved by reducing the switching regulator power dissipation factors Pdα as follows:

Dissipation factors:

(1) ON-Resistance dissipation of inductor and FET : Pd(I<sup>2</sup>R)

$$Pd(I^2R) = I_{OUT}^2 \times (R_{COIL} + R_{ON})$$

 $R_{COIL}$  is the DC resistance of inductor  $R_{ON}$  is the ON-Resistance of FET  $I_{OUT}$  is the Output current

(2) Gate charge/discharge dissipation : Pd(Gate)

(3) Switching dissipation: Pd(SW)

(4) ESR dissipation of capacitor : Pd(ESR)

(5) Operating Current Dissipation of IC: Pd(IC)



### 5. Consideration on Permissible Dissipation and Heat Generation

Since this IC functions with high efficiency without significant heat generation in most applications, no special consideration is needed on permissible dissipation or heat generation. In case of extreme conditions, however, including lower input voltage, higher output voltage, heavier load, and/or higher temperature, the permissible dissipation and/or heat generation must be carefully considered.

For dissipation, only conduction losses due to the DC resistance of inductor and ON-Resistance of FET are considered. This is because conduction losses are most significant among other dissipations mentioned above such as gate charge/discharge dissipation and switching dissipation.

Since RONP is greater than RONN in this IC, the dissipation increases as the ON duty becomes higher. Taking into consideration the dissipation shown above, thermal design must be carried out with allowable sufficient margin.

### 6. Selection of Components Externally Connected

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Figure 26. Output Ripple Current

The inductance significantly depends on output ripple current. As shown in equation (1), the ripple current decreases as the inductor and/or switching frequency increases.

$$\Delta I_L = \frac{\left(V_{CC} - V_{OUT}\right) \times V_{OUT}}{L \times V_{CC} \times f} \qquad [A] \quad . \quad . \quad (1)$$

Appropriate ripple current at output should be +/-30% of the maximum output current.

Where:

 $\Delta I_L$  is the Output ripple current, and f is the Switching frequency

Note: Current exceeding the current rating of the inductor results in magnetic saturation of the inductor, which decreases efficiency.


The inductor must be selected allowing sufficient margin with which the peak current may not exceed its current rating.

If  $V_{CC}$ =5V,  $V_{OUT}$ =1.5V, f=1MHz,  $\Delta I_L$ =0.3A x 0.8A=0.24A, for example,

$$L = \frac{(5-1.5)\times1.5}{0.24\times5\times1M} = 4.375\mu \to 4.7 \qquad [\mu H]$$

Note: Select an inductor with low resistance component (such as DCR and ACR) to minimize dissipation in the inductor for better efficiency.

### (2) Selection of Output Capacitor (Co)



Output capacitor should be selected with the consideration on the stability region and the equivalent series resistance required to minimize ripple voltage. Output ripple voltage is determined by the equation (4)

$$\Delta V_{OUT} = \Delta I_L \times ESR \qquad [V] \quad \cdot \quad \cdot \quad (4)$$

Where:

 $\Delta I_L$  is the Output ripple current, and

ESR is the Equivalent series resistance of output capacitor

Note: Rating of the capacitor should be determined allowing sufficient margin against output voltage. Less ESR allows reduction in output ripple voltage.

Since output rise time is designed to fall within the soft-start time, the capacitance of output capacitor should be determined by the requirements of equation (5):

$$C_O \le \frac{t_{SS} \times (I_{LIMIT} - I_{OUT})}{V_{OUT}} \qquad (5)$$

Where:

 $t_{SS}$ : Soft-Start time

 $I_{LIMIT}$ : Over current detection level, 2A(Typ)

In case of BD8964FVM, for instance, and if  $V_{OUT}$ =1.5V,  $I_{OUT}$ =0.8A, and  $t_{SS}$ =1ms,

Rating of the capacitor should be determined to allow a sufficient margin against output voltage. A  $10\mu F$  to  $100\mu F$  ceramic capacitor is recommended.

### Selection of input capacitor (C<sub>IN</sub>)

Input capacitor must be a low ESR capacitor with a capacitance sufficient to cope with high ripple current to prevent high transient voltage. The ripple current I<sub>RMS</sub> is given by the equation (5):

$$I_{RMS} = I_{OUT} \times \frac{\sqrt{V_{OUT}(V_{CC} - V_{OUT})}}{V_{CC}} \qquad [A] \cdot \cdot \cdot (6)$$

A low ESR 10µF/10V ceramic capacitor is recommended to reduce ESR dissipation of input capacitor for better efficiency.

### Calculating R<sub>ITH</sub>, C<sub>ITH</sub> for Phase Compensation

Since the Current Mode Control is designed to limit the inductor current, a pole (phase lag) appears in the low frequency area due to a CR filter consisting of the output capacitor and the load resistance, while a zero (phase lead) appears in the high frequency area due to the output capacitor and its ESR. Therefore, the phases are easily compensated by adding a zero to the power amplifier output with C and R as described below to cancel a pole at the power amplifier.





Figure 29. Open Loop Gain Characteristics

Figure 30. Error Amp Phase Compensation Characteristics




Figure 31. Typical Application

Stable feedback loop may be achieved by canceling the pole fp (Min) produced by the output capacitor and the load resistance with CR zero correction by the error amplifier.

### (5) Setting the output voltage

The output voltage V<sub>OUT</sub> is determined by the equation (7):

 $V_{ADJ}$  is the Voltage at ADJ terminal (0.8V Typ)

The required output voltage may be determined by adjusting R<sub>1</sub> and R<sub>2</sub>.




Figure 32. 出力電圧設定抵抗

Use 1  $k\Omega$  to 100 $k\Omega$  resistor for R<sub>1</sub>. If a resistor higher than 100 $k\Omega$  is used, check the assembled set carefully for ripple voltage etc.

### 7. BD8964FVM Cautions on PC Board Layout




Figure 33. Layout Diagram

- ① For the sections drawn with heavy line, use thick conductor pattern as short as possible.
- 2 Layout the input ceramic capacitor C<sub>IN</sub> closer to the pins PVCC and PGND, and the output capacitor C<sub>O</sub> closer to the pin PGND.
- 3 Layout C<sub>ITH</sub> and R<sub>ITH</sub> between the pins ITH and GND as near as possible with least necessary wiring.

Note: The parts list presented above is an example of recommended parts. Although the parts are standard, actual circuit characteristics should be checked on your application carefully before use. Be sure to allow sufficient margins to accommodate variations between external devices and this IC when employing the depicted circuit with other circuit constants modified. Both static and transient characteristics should be considered in establishing these margins. When switching noise is significant and may affect the system, a low pass filter should be inserted between the VCC and PVCC pins, and a schottky barrier diode established between the SW and PGND pins.




Figure 34. I/O Equivalent Circuit

### **Operational Notes**

### 1. Reverse Connection of Power Supply

Connecting the power supply in reverse polarity can damage the IC. Take precautions against reverse polarity when connecting the power supply, such as mounting an external diode between the power supply and the IC's power supply pins.

### 2. Power Supply Lines

Design the PCB layout pattern to provide low impedance supply lines. Separate the ground and supply lines of the digital and analog blocks to prevent noise in the ground and supply lines of the digital block from affecting the analog block. Furthermore, connect a capacitor to ground at all power supply pins. Consider the effect of temperature and aging on the capacitance value when using electrolytic capacitors.

### 3. Ground Voltage

Ensure that no pins are at a voltage below that of the ground pin at any time, even during transient condition.

### 4. Ground Wiring Pattern

When using both small-signal and large-current ground traces, the two ground traces should be routed separately but connected to a single ground at the reference point of the application board to avoid fluctuations in the small-signal ground caused by large currents. Also ensure that the ground traces of external components do not cause variations on the ground voltage. The ground lines must be as short and thick as possible to reduce line impedance.

### 5. Thermal Consideration

Should by any chance the power dissipation rating be exceeded the rise in temperature of the chip may result in deterioration of the properties of the chip. In case of exceeding this absolute maximum rating, increase the board size and copper area to prevent exceeding the Pd rating.

### 6. Recommended Operating Conditions

These conditions represent a range within which the expected characteristics of the IC can be approximately obtained. The electrical characteristics are guaranteed under the conditions of each parameter.

### 7. Inrush Current

When power is first supplied to the IC, it is possible that the internal logic may be unstable and inrush current may flow instantaneously due to the internal powering sequence and delays, especially if the IC has more than one power supply. Therefore, give special consideration to power coupling capacitance, power wiring, width of ground wiring, and routing of connections.

### 8. Operation Under Strong Electromagnetic Field

Operating the IC in the presence of a strong electromagnetic field may cause the IC to malfunction.

### 9. Testing on Application Boards

When testing the IC on an application board, connecting a capacitor directly to a low-impedance output pin may subject the IC to stress. Always discharge capacitors completely after each process or step. The IC's power supply should always be turned off completely before connecting or removing it from the test setup during the inspection process. To prevent damage from static discharge, ground the IC during assembly and use similar precautions during transport and storage.

### 10. Inter-pin Short and Mounting Errors

Ensure that the direction and position are correct when mounting the IC on the PCB. Incorrect mounting may result in damaging the IC. Avoid nearby pins being shorted to each other especially to ground, power supply and output pin. Inter-pin shorts could be due to many reasons such as metal particles, water droplets (in very humid environment) and unintentional solder bridge deposited in between pins during assembly to name a few.

### **Operational Notes - continued**

### 11. Unused Input Pins

Input pins of an IC are often connected to the gate of a MOS transistor. The gate has extremely high impedance and extremely low capacitance. If left unconnected, the electric field from the outside can easily charge it. The small charge acquired in this way is enough to produce a significant effect on the conduction through the transistor and cause unexpected operation of the IC. So unless otherwise specified, unused input pins should be connected to the power supply or ground line.

### 12. Regarding the Input Pin of the IC

This monolithic IC contains P+ isolation and P substrate layers between adjacent elements in order to keep them isolated. P-N junctions are formed at the intersection of the P layers with the N layers of other elements, creating a parasitic diode or transistor. For example (refer to figure below):

When GND > Pin A and GND > Pin B, the P-N junction operates as a parasitic diode.

When GND > Pin B, the P-N junction operates as a parasitic transistor.

Parasitic diodes inevitably occur in the structure of the IC. The operation of parasitic diodes can result in mutual interference among circuits, operational faults, or physical damage. Therefore, conditions that cause these diodes to operate, such as applying a voltage lower than the GND voltage to an input pin (and thus to the P substrate) should be avoided.




Figure 35. Example of monolithic IC structure

### 13. Thermal Shutdown Circuit(TSD)


This IC has a built-in thermal shutdown circuit that prevents heat damage to the IC. Normal operation should always be within the IC's power dissipation rating. If however the rating is exceeded for a continued period, the junction temperature (Tj) will rise which will activate the TSD circuit that will turn OFF all output pins. When the Tj falls below the TSD threshold, the circuits are automatically restored to normal operation.

Note that the TSD circuit operates in a situation that exceeds the absolute maximum ratings and therefore, under no circumstances, should the TSD circuit be used in a set design or for any purpose other than protecting the IC from heat damage.


### 14. Selection of Inductor

It is recommended to use an inductor with a series resistance element (DCR)  $0.1\Omega$  or less. Especially, note that use of a high DCR inductor will cause an inductor loss, resulting in decreased output voltage. Should this condition continue for a specified period (soft start time + timer latch time), output short circuit protection will be activated and output will be latched OFF. When using an inductor over  $0.1\Omega$ , be careful to ensure adequate margins for variation between external devices and this IC, including transient as well as static characteristics. Furthermore, in any case, it is recommended to start up the output with EN after supply voltage is within.


