



Fig.1 Power Dissipation Derating Curve




Fig.2 Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig.3 Normalized Transient Thermal Resistance vs. Pulse Width





Fig.4 Single Pulse Maximum Power Dissipation

Fig.5 Typical Output Characteristics(I)




Fig.6 Typical Output Characteristics(II)




Fig.7 Normalized Breakdown Voltage vs. Junction Temperature





Fig.8 Typical Transfer Characteristics

Fig.9 Gate Threshold Voltage vs. Junction Temperature




Fig.10 Forward Transfer Admittance vs. Drain Current




Fig.11 Drain Current Derating Curve





Fig.12 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Gate Source Voltage

Fig.13 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Junction Temperature




Fig.14 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current (II)




Fig.15 Typical Capacitances vs. Drain - Source Voltage





Fig.16 Switching Characteristics

Fig.17 Typical Gate Charge





Fig.18 Source Current vs. Source Drain Voltage

Fig.1-1 Switching Time Measurement Circuit




Fig.1-2 Switching Waveforms




Fig.2-1 Gate Charge Measurement Circuit




Fig.2-2 Gate Charge Waveform




Fig.3-1 Avalanche Measurement Circuit





Fig.3-2 Avalanche Waveform

- In principle, the reflow soldering method must be used on a surface-mount products, the flow soldering method must be used on a through hole mount products. If the flow soldering method is preferred on a surface-mount products, please consult with the ROHM representative in advance.

1. If change is made to the constant of an external circuit, please allow a sufficient margin considering variations of the characteristics of the Products and external components, including transient characteristics, as well as static characteristics.
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### Precaution for Electrostatic

This Product is electrostatic sensitive product, which may be damaged due to electrostatic discharge. Please take proper caution in your manufacturing process and storage so that voltage exceeding the Products maximum rating will not be applied to Products. Please take special care under dry condition (e.g. Grounding of human body / equipment / solder iron, isolation from charged objects, setting of Ionizer, friction prevention and temperature / humidity control).

### Precaution for Storage / Transportation

1. Product performance and soldered connections may deteriorate if the Products are stored in the places where:
  - [a] the Products are exposed to sea winds or corrosive gases, including Cl<sub>2</sub>, H<sub>2</sub>S, NH<sub>3</sub>, SO<sub>2</sub>, and NO<sub>2</sub>
  - [b] the temperature or humidity exceeds those recommended by ROHM
  - [c] the Products are exposed to direct sunshine or condensation
  - [d] the Products are exposed to high Electrostatic
